

I did a pretty good job but on the back of each sign I scribbled things like "LOU IS GOOD-VOTE FOR LOU" and a whole bunch of stupid such "calls for votes" Lou got back and asked to see my work, I showed him and they haven't yet invented the word for his utter despair.

Memories From Betsy Maloney Spitler

I first met Fr. G. Gordon Henderson on City Line Avenue in front of St. Joseph's College in the fall of 1961. It was break time between the entrance examination for Wheeling College. He was pacing up and down in front of the Gothic entrance to St. Joe's. (I was familiar with St. Joe's because my father was a full time day student from 1951 to 1955 when he graduated.)

I was nervous, fearful that I would not pass the exam and Fr Henderson must have picked up the agitation I was experiencing. With a few well-placed words he eased my fears and I went back into the classroom and gave it my all. Luckily I passed and the next time I met with Fr. Henderson was at Wheeling in March of 1962. My parents and I were there for a "look see" of the campus and meet with the counselor-Fr. Henderson. Father had a student give me a tour of campus while he spoke with my parents then he interviewed me. I must have said the correct things because I was admitted to the class of 1966. This was shaky because I was not a sterling academic individual. Learning came hard for me and I had another handicap if you will. My father had promised me only one year as a trial. He firmly believed that educating me would be a waste because I would end up married with children and not use my education. We also did not have the extra money; we were just above the poverty level.

Throughout that first year Fr. would generally ask me how it was going and I would respond "Ok or fine". He would look me in the eye to see if I was being truthful or not. If not, he would give me some encouraging words and I would continue with a lighter heart.

Of course I was struggling to keep my head above water and garner a decent QPA. I thought I was meeting all the markers when suddenly my parents showed up to talk to Father Henderson. Disaster! My father was going to pull me out of school either for the grades or money. You see I had a younger brother who was mentally challenged with some physical problems and both parents worked to keep him at a facility.

Well I ended up finishing Wheeling with my class because Fr. Henderson in that interview told my father that my education would never be wasted. I would use every bit of knowledge and experiences from college in my jobs and life experiences. So I owe Fr. Henderson a lot for convincing my father to let me continue at Wheeling and in my senior year he taught me to appreciate Scotch.

The Long Reach of WJU—Ed Kelleher

The year was 1974. The place, Tokyo, Japan.

Eight years earlier I had graduated from what was then Wheeling College, spent four years in Uncle Sam's Air Force and a few more years studying, teaching and then newspapering in Tokyo. I was newly married and had been working on the copy desk of The Japan Times for about a year.

The copy desk phone rang. It was for me. A fellow named George. I strained to recall if I had met anybody by the name of George recently – maybe in a darts tournament at a British-style pub? Maybe not. The caller went on. "It's George Blake, from Wheeling College, a year behind you. I've just taken over as managing editor of the Pacific Daily News here in Guam, and I came across your name when I was going through the files. Want a job?" (Continued) on next page)

Go figure. Two Wheeling alumni burning up the phone lines between Guam and Tokyo. What are the odds? I explained to George that I was just about to jump ship at take form in Father Krieger's Fine Arts classes. So much The Japan Times and head across town to The Daily Yomiuri, another English-language newspaper but one that offered about twice the salary I was making. That, coupled with family considerations, meant it wasn't a good time for a move to Guam.

Long story short, we set up a stringer arrangements where I would write free-lance pieces with a Japan-Guam hook and feed them to the Pacific Daily News.

Fifteen months later George dangled a job that was more enticing than the original offer, and we packed up and headed to that Pacific island that bills itself as "Where America's Day Begins."

Pause here for a digression. Enter Jon Reed Donnelly, a Wheeling classmate who had made ends meet for his young family (bride: classmate Sandra Wunderlich) during his college years by working downtown at the Wheeling Intelligencer. After graduation, Jon was hired as a newsroom staffer for The Richmond News Leader in my hometown of Richmond, VA.

In addition to his editing duties, Jon created a niche for himself as the newspaper's aviation writer, which carried some perks (an early trans-Atlantic ride on the brand new Concorde, etc.) Under the pretext of aviation research, Jon finagled a flight to Tokyo, and then worked out a side trip to Guam, where he popped in unannounced in fall 1975. So there we were – George, Jon and myself, all veterans of The Spokesman staff – hanging out together in the far Pacific.

Jon later alerted me to some impending job openings at the News Leader, and by 1977 I was back in Virginia working at that paper. At one point Jon was state editor, and I was one of his reporters. Later on, when he moved on into the world of emergency services, I moved into the spot he was vacating – associate city editor.

I stayed in the news business, Jon became a pioneer in emergency services regional cooperation, and he and I remained fast friends until his death in January 2015.

George Blake (Class of '67) meanwhile had parlayed successful stints at a number of Gannett-owned newspapers to become executive editor and vice president of the Cincinnati Enquirer. He later became an executive in the fields of public relations and finance.

All of which goes to show that no matter how small WJU might be in student population, the relationships made there often tend to reach into far-off places and have a lasting impact.

Academic excellence. That is what came to mind when I was asked to share my thoughts. In my sophomore year President Kennedy was killed. I was in Father O'Brien's Logic class when an upperclassman interrupted with the news. At the end of that year a few of us took off to Mexico to study at the University Ibero Americana to take a class offered by Fr. Henderson.

In my Junior year ten of us returned to campus to discover that we were assigned to off campus housing. A house we affectionately referred to as 'the outhouse'. Aptly named because the house in front of ours was so much nicer and inhabited by sophomores. In the winter we discovered that we did not need to refrigerate our food because when left out on the counter overnight it developed frost crystals. We all would be sure to be at the house when the 'Laugh In' show came on the TV.

On one especially cold week our house temperature in the warmest room was not above 56 degrees. The furnace ran nonstop but to no avail. We complained and the Dean of Women offered her house. We put our mattresses in the warm 56 degree room rather than go to the Dean's house.

Apparently we were rewarded in our senior year by being housed in the newly constructed apartments. My suite mates were great. They did ask me in a very polite way to notify them when I had to type one of many English papers so that they could be sure to make themselves scarce. Typing not my strong suit. Just when we thought all of the testing was finished, we were rewarded with days of Grad Records. We took all areas. Some were seen to put their heads down or draw patterns when not being tested in their major.

A pseudo academic requirement was learning to play Bridge. Rare was the person who could walk through the snack bar and not be asked to be a fourth for someone who needed to go to class.

Tribute to Father Henry J. Miller, SJ By Daniel McCloskey '65

Father Miller taught physics, my major, at Wheeling College in addition to skiing. Father helped me obtain a summer job at Alpine Geophysical Associates, Inc.

In the summer of 1964, Bernie Brunner (Class of '64, Wheeling College) and I went to work for Alpine Geophysical in northern New Jersey doing site and foundation surveys. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey was looking at sites for a fourth airport in northern New Jersey. Sites included an area by Greenwood Lake, the current location of the Meadowlands and a third site around Dover. Father Miller was the geophysicist and field supervisor.

The foundation work was seismic refraction. (I believe Father Miller received his degree(s) in geophysics from Boston College). Bernie and I would lay out lines of geophones. A blaster would detonate a stick of dynamite at a depth Fr. Miller specified. Fr. Miller would analyze the data and adjust the surveys. Over the course of the summer, Bernie and I learned a lot of geophysics (reflection and refraction) and geology.

An aside: During site changes, Bernie and I worked on the MN FALCON, a trawler converted to a research vessel. Alpine was mapping offshore sand deposits (seismic reflection) for the Army Corps of Engineers. During one of these changes, I saw the center span of the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge raised into position.

When I returned to Wheeling in the fall of 1964, I asked about Fr. Miller. I was told he knew he wasn't coming back. Nearing graduation, instead of writing a resume, I called Alpine and started there shortly after graduation. Hank was there. We talked and later skied together. I started in a project mapping acoustic provinces in the North Atlantic which involved oceanography and geophysics. I spent time at sea gathering data and in the office reducing data. During one of my turns in the office, Alpine was contracted to do the foundation survey for the World Trade Center (destroyed on 9/11) in Manhattan. Hank, I and the blaster from New Jersey and probably others, worked at night.

Sometime during 1966, I passed my draft physical. Alpine petitioned the Navy to give me a deferment. Three days before I was to report for induction, with my parents in Jersey to take my car home, the telex machine at Alpine confirmed my deferment. I have never been in the service thanks to the deferment.

I was put in charge (Master) of the MN FALCON mapping sand offshore sand deposits on the New England coast. The FALCON went aground off Chatham, Mass and broke up in a nor'easter. I was transferred to the Ocean Cable Protection Group at Bell Labs, where I met my wife. Sometime in this period, I lost touch with Hank.

Several years ago, I had some time in NYC. I went over to Alpine and discussed Hank. They knew about him, but didn't know his whereabouts.

Several months ago, I lost some friends to cancer. I started thinking about death. Hank came to mind. If he hadn't got me that summer job in 1964, I would probably still be in Vietnam!!!

I know another ex-Jesuit, who alluded that ex-Jesuits tend to keep in contact with current Jesuits. With that in mind, I contacted Father Jim O'Brien, SJ to see what he knew about Hank. A contact of Father O'Brien's thought Hank had passed on.

Another aside: After the alumni mass on Saturday, I introduced myself to Father Haig telling him he taught me physics. He asked if I did anything with it. I responded that I had been an oceanographer, geophysicist and an engineer.

Message from WJU President Fr. Jim Fleming

This year started with a wonderful experience as I travelled over 1000 miles through Florida with Dr. Ed Shahady and Fr. Bill George, S.J. We visited with Alumni and Friends of WJU in North Palm Beach, Coral Springs, Orlando, Clearwater, Bonita Springs and Fort Myers. It was wonderful.

The first gathering began with Mass in Mo Faul's home and at the home of John and Marlene Yasinsky. Fr. George lead us in a brief Examination of Conscience and St. Ignatius prayer for generosity. John and Judith Black DiFazio hosted us in their home which had a magnificent view of the ocean in Clearwater. We really got to know Florida.

This was my first trip to Florida to visit alumni, following Fr. George's trip last year. Everyone was so welcoming and enthusiastic about Wheeling Jesuit that I was energized. I brought them up to date on the "Jesuit Strong" program, enrollment, athletics (We are National Champion D II for Volleyball) and Fr. George summarized our Federal Proposal on how to deal with the large number of non-violent substance abusers being let out of prison or being assigned to treatment. We hope to set a national exemplar on how to help people recover. Our unique approach will be to help them manage all the various elements of recovery, from the judicial, medical, psychological, educational, social, employment and housing issues, etc. Quite a challenge.

When each meeting broke up, Fr. George gave everyone an envelope with WJU Points of Pride and a Troy Legacy Society form.

You may already know that our Wheeling Jesuit Women's Volleyball team won the 2015 National Championship for Division II. When you learn that the average GPA of the team is 3.6 you can be extra proud of our women. Our volleyball coach has already received offers to leave WJU for a higher salary, but she and her husband, her assistant coach, have said they will stay at WJU.

On Jan. 22, our Men's Cardinal Basketball team defeated West Liberty, the then #1 Ranked Div. II Basketball team, 106-83 at home. We were ranked #13, but will surely move up! By-Laws: Active Membership: (1) All graduates of Wheeling Jesuit University upon the 50th anniversary of the graduation of his or her class. (2) All former members of the class who have attended at least one semester.

Charter Membership: indicating the original or founding members shall be open to all members of Classes of 1959 and 1960 who are qualified for Active membership.

<u>Honorary Membership</u>: Extended to the President of Wheeling Jesuit University and to any other friend of the university.

<u>Posthumous Membership</u>: shall be open to those who were otherwise eligible for active membership but are deceased prior to the 50th anniversary of the class.

Annual Meeting: Conducted at the time of the 50 year reunion.

By-Law Changes: Recommended by the executive committee and approved by the members at the annual meeting

Executive Committee: Consists of all four officers, members at large, and the immediate past president, the alumni director and a representative of the Alumni Council, will serve as the governing body of the organization. The president of the organization will serve as chair of the committee. The executive committee shall meet periodically by conference call or in person if needed. These meetings will be called by the Chair. The committee will meet in person at least one time a year at the time of the 50th reunion.

Committees: Committees /task forces can be appointed by the President and or Executive committee as needed.

Senior Ambassadors: Senior Ambassadors are part of the WJU 50 Year Club. Inaugural nominees will be graduates from the classes of 1959 through 1968 who have distinguished themselves through one or more of the following: volunteer community service, humanitarian efforts, academic accomplishments and a successful career.

Being a WJU Senior Ambassador is both an honor and a responsibility. Ambassadors are asked to commit their time, dedication and expertise to the school that helped lay the foundation for their successful careers. This commitment will include one or more of the following: Recruit potential students to WJU, Aid current students with career advice, Cultivate interest in WJU and its projects, Encourage fellow alumni and others to support WJU fund raising activities. The first Senior Ambassadors group met June 24, 2011 to discuss their future activities. There are 54 individuals who have volunteered from the classes of 59 through 63. The group meets yearly at the time of the reunion and then by conference call during the year. Senior Ambassadors are dedicated fund raisers for WJU.

DRIVE365 is the year long campaign (July 2014 through June 2015) and the Senior Ambassadors pledged to raise \$365,000. The Ambassadors from the classes of 1959-1968 made personal contacts to classmates asking for their support of the University. They surpassed their goal by raising \$382,318 by June 30, 2015.

Alumni Scholar in Residence: This program, initiated by the 50 Year Club in 2011, represents a partnership with the university faculty and administration. A committee representing all three groups selects the scholar and coordinates the campus visit. The scholar will be a visiting professor to the University for up to one week and all expenses will be donated by the scholar. The initial scholar was Ed Shahady, M.D. '60, was on campus in the fall of 2011. Joan Davison Ph.D. '78 was the second scholar and was on campus in the fall of 2012. The third scholar was Dick Riley, Ph.D. and he was on campus in the fall of 2013. The Honorable James Smith 64' was on campus fall of 2014. Christina Richey, Ph.D. '04 was the scholar for 2015. The Alumni Scholar Program has been very successful and demonstrates the quality of WJU graduates to the students and faculty of WJU.
