# Mary and Joseph Could Have Been College Students

he center of the liturgical worship on our campus is in the Chapel of Mary and Joseph. It was completed in 1984; Father Walter Buckius

celebrated the first public mass on Christmas Eve. This history, along with the name Mary and Joseph, will always associate the Chapel to the Feast of the Nativity.

Most biblical commentators believe that Mary was a young girl, probably not yet in her 20's, and that Joseph would not have been much older at the time of their betrothal. In today's society, they might well be college students, but in those days marriages took place at a younger age and Joseph would already be at work as an

apprentice carpenter.

Even though we romanticize the Nativity, the conditions must have been much different. Both Mary and Joseph

suffered extreme perplexity trying to understand Mary's unique conception, and only after a second divine intervention was it clear to Joseph that Mary's pregnancy was a supernatural, as well as natural,

event. The trip to Bethlehem, walking at full term, would be frightening as well as grueling. Inns and hostelries were full, and only an abandoned shepherd's cave offered some shelter for birth. Then followed a flight into Egypt to save a child's life, a second relocation to Nazareth, and Joseph's death.

As we celebrate the Feast of the Nativity, it is easier to relate to Mary and

Joseph as a couple not much different from most married couples, struggling with a host of unexpected occurrences, rising to meet them, and growing in personal affection and holiness. How fitting it is that the Sunday after Christmas we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family.

We at Wheeling Jesuit University wish you and all of your loved ones the blessings of Christmas and the strength of the Holy Family. May the continued patronage of Mary and Joseph in our

chapel be a source of inspiration to our students and a source of strengthening prayer to all of our graduates and friends. The Jesuit Community will not forget you. Remember us also.

# Olympic-Style Track Built at WJU

heeling Jesuit University will soon have a state-ofthe-art running track similar to the one built in Atlanta for the Olympics.

The 400-meter track, scheduled to open this spring, is being built beside the McDonough Center. It will feature a Mondo surface, developed by Mondo Rubber International of Italy and recognized as the premier running surface in the world.

"It's truly an all-weather surface," said Mark Swiger, coach of Wheeling Jesuit's track and cross country teams. "Most all-weather surfaces are just rubberized asphalt, which are more resilient in the fall than in winter, but the Mondo surface stays the same all year. You can train on the track year round."

Swiger noted that Mondo has constructed the surface for every Summer Olympics track since 1976, and said its product is unique because the surface is prefabricated.

#### **Alumnus Elected to PA Senate**

Tim Murphy '74 was elected to a four-year term in the Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in November. He represents the southern section of Allegheny County.

Tim works as a psychologist at Mercy Hospital. He and his wife, Nan, have a daughter, Bevin, 9. The Murphy family joined the Wheeling Jesuit University community at a



recent Sunday Mass in a prayer of thanksgiving.

Tim won with an 8 percent margin in what was expected to be one of the closest races on Election Day.

# Physical Therapy Program Receives Accreditation

heeling Jesuit's physical therapy program recently received a five-year initial accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Physical Therapy Education, said Department Chair Dr. Mary Jo Wisniewski.

The student-centered program admitted its first class of students in January 1995 and will graduate its first class in December of this year.

"The Wheeling Jesuit physical therapy program is unique because it is one of the few problem-based curricula in the country," Wisniewski said. "Our program is on the leading edge of physical therapy education."

She said graduates are being offered employment in large and small practices across the country, with many going into practice in rural

communities where there isn't the glitz, glamour and technological advances often accompanying jobs in bigger cities.

#### New Class Examines Sports Marketing

ven if your athletic ability never took you past little league. it is still possible to have a career in sports.

A new sports marketing class is being introduced at Wheeling Jesuit University that can make it easier to get involved with the business side of sports. The new class, which is open to the public as wel as Wheeling Jesuit students, was created by WJU professor Paul Ostasiewski, who promotes power boat races in the area.

"To our knowledge, this is the first time a course like this has been offered locally," he said. "The reason we're offering it is because sports is very much a business. It takes in almost \$100 billion a year in the United States. When you add the participants plus the pro teams, plus sports equipment, it is a huge industry."

# International Recruiting **Efforts Continue**


JU Dean of Students Bud Hall and Wellness Director Daniel Caron recently made international recruiting visits.

**Ex-Diplomat Among New Faculty** 

ohn Egan McAteer '61, a long-time diplomat who oversaw relief efforts in Ethiopia and Somalia, is among the 11 new faculty members who are teaching at Wheeling Jesuit University during the fall semester.

McAteer is an assistant professor of social science who has a 27-year career in foreign service to share with his students. He was director of operations in the northeast region of Somalia, and left the country about a week before several U.S. soldiers were killed in Mogadishu.

He was sent to Somalia as part of the American support for United Nations efforts to create stability in the nation. The goals of the mission were to re-establish a political system of district councils and explore the kinds of humanitarian assistance the UN could provide. Councils had been established in six of the 13 designated zones at the time of the shootings.

"The chances are at least 50-50 we could have gotten a critical mass of councils established," McAteer said. "Whether the UN could have gotten a constitutional convention is more difficult to say. The killings and the fact that the U.S. was not enthusiastic to police the operation with troops brought an end to the effort. Once the UN left, the country went back to a truce between major clans, which was often broken by fighting."

McAteer was most recently deputy chief of the U.S. Mission to United Nation Agencies in Rome. He is now teaching for the first time since he was an instructor in 1982-83 at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, CT.

Charles holds a Ph.D. in comparative literature from the University of Alberta.  Norman Duffy-professor of chemistry. He was most recently employed in the Department of Chemistry at Kent State Univ. Duffy obtained a Ph.D. in chemistry at Georgetown Univ.

 David Kilroy-assistant professor of history. An Irish native who graduated from University College Dublin, he comes to WJU from the University of Iowa, where he earned a Ph.D. in history.

 Renata-Maria Marroum-visiting assistant professor of physics. Marroum was science education project coordinator for Kent State University, Liquid Crystal Institute and NSF Science and Technology Center for Advanced Liquid Crystalline Optical Materials, and has a Ph.D. in mathematical sciences in physics from the University of Texas at Arlington.

 Peter Pagan-Aguiar-instructor in philosophy. He was most recently a teaching fellow at Fordham University in New York.
 Pagan-Aguiar completed a Ph.D. from Fordham in September.

• Leslie Quinn-instructor in biology. She comes to Wheeling Jesuit from Marshall University, where she taught physiology. She recently completed a Ph.D. in physiology at Marshall.

• Edward Rugeley-instructor in political science. He was a political science instructor at West Virginia University. Rugeley holds a J.D. from the Washington and Lee University School of Law and expects to complete a Ph.D. at WVU in May.

 Michael Seale-visiting professor of physics. He recently completed a Ph.D. at William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA, where he served as a graduate teaching assistant in astronomy labs.

 Donald Serva-academic associate professor in biology. He comes to WJU from St. Ignatius High School in Cleveland, OH, where he taught biology. Serva holds M.Div. and S.T.M. degrees from the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley Univ. in California.

### **BHRM Expanding Throughout the State**

tudents don't need to come to Wheeling to attend Wheeling Jesuit University. If they are interested in the Bachelor of Arts in Human Resource Management program, they can go to Weirton, Clarksburg, Parkersburg or Charleston.

The expansion of the BHRM program over the past six years has opened the quality of a Jesuit education to people from all over the state.

The BHRM program began at WJU in the fall of 1987 and was first moved off-site when it was offered in Weirton in January of 1990. It moved to Parkersburg in May of that year and expanded to Clarksburg in August 1995 and to Charleston last May.

Becky Forney, director of administration and marketing for Graduate and Adult Education, said the BHRM program is designed for people 25 or older who have at least 60 semester hours of transferrable college credit. It is a 15-month program with classes offered one night per week.

"The program is designed to teach course management skills, communication skills, leadership, decision making, problem solving and research," she

said. "It teaches students how to manage people in organizations. It's not strictly a personnel degree."

Approximately 270 persons have already received BHRM degrees from Wheeling Jesuit and another 200 are currently completing the requirements. For more information on the BHRM program, call Forney at 1-800-873-7665.

## **WJU Environmental Project Funded**

Wheeling Jesuit University project to develop a watershed plan for Wheeling Creek recently received a \$25,000 renewal grant from the Virginia Environmental Endowment.

The watershed plan will identify environmental issues and concerns in the watershed, develop priority strategies and draft a comprehensive plan for community education and stream restoration activities.

It is being developed by WJU's Environmental Science Program in partnership with the Wheeling Environmental Conservation Association and West Virginia's new Stream Partners Program.

"We view this as a tremendous opportunity to work with the Wheeling community and facilitate a broad-based, bottom-up approach to environmental problem solving in the

Ohio River Valley," said Ben Stout, WJU's director of environmental studies.


He is a biophysicist by training and has been involved in solving hundreds of quality control and manufacturing problems. He is also an experienced electron microscopist and instrumenta chemist.

Fr. Hanzely, Original Faculty Member, Retires

r. Joseph B. Hanzely, S.J., first came to Wheeling College in 1955, and stayed through two name changes, all five presidents and the graduation of nearly 6,400 students. He left Aug. 4 for a Jesuit community in Wernersville, PA, where he began his retirement.

Hanzely, a biology professor, was part of the original faculty at the new college. He had just received a graduate degree in biology from Catholic University in Washington, DC, when he was notified that he had been assigned to teach in Wheeling.

"There was a real optimism about the college," Hanzely recalls.

"One indication of that was the many special preparations that were made for teaching, such as the labs. There was a real spirit of confidence that the college was going to survive."

Hanzely has watched the college grow from its early days when there were no on-campus residence halls and teachers often had to work just as hard outside the classroom to ensure that the college was running smoothly.

He has seen Wheeling College become Wheeling Jesuit College in 1987 and turn into a university this summer. Hanzely has been here through the college's difficult years and has enjoyed the rapid growth and expansion of the past decade. He thinks the Jesuit founders would be proud of the way their college turned out.

Hanzely, born in 1917, entered the Jesuit order July 30, 1935, at a novitiate called St. Andrew-on-Hudson in Poughkeepsie, NY. He studied theology at Woodstock College and was ordained to the priesthood June 20, 1948. At Wheeling Jesuit, Hanzely was named chair of the biology department in 1980 and was promoted to the rank of professor emeritus in 1990.

Hanzely's service with the Jesuits will now end much as it began. The Wernersville community is a place where many young, aspiring Jesuit priests go to be schooled in the traditions of the Jesuit Order and religious life.

## **Pieber Heads Advancement Office**

ev Carl Pieber C.M., a long-time educator and development professional, is Wheeling Jesuit's new vice president for advancement.

Pieber, who took over his new position in August, said his goals include demonstrating to potential donors the positive impact they can have on the university and community.

"I would hope we could increase not only the number of donors but also our service to them," Pieber said. "I hope the donors will find the university better because of their gifts, and I hope we can show that to them."

"It provides an excellent education for the price," Pieber said. "Very few schools have a wellness



Wheeling Jesuit began the fall semester with its name three letters longer. Earlier this year, the board of directors approved changing Wheeling Jesuit from a college to a university The announcement was simple yet direct. With the move, the institution not only changed its name, but also changed how it is viewed nationally and internationally.

In the board's deliberations, there was no one item that prompted the decision.

However, the growing number of graduate courses, the importance of the NASA initiatives and the increased strength of international travel and commerce where the word "university" is operative, all played an important role in the decision. The board of directors believed the shift would happen someday. There was an impetus to seize the moment, to let it happen now, and to utilize the change

as stimulus for excellence.

In a phrase, Wheeling Jesuit should challenge itself internally to fit the external name university. The transformation has begun with the growth around campus. Those three additional letters prove the institution has accepted the challenge.

Today, in the family of 28 Jesuit colleges and universities, there are 20 with the name university and eight called college. Boston College is an anomaly There is already a Boston University, so Boston College, a doctoral granting institution, cannot easily shift the name, even if it so desired. Prior history has limited its opportunity.

University has too frequently been associated with size. If an institution is large, then it can be called a university. In a similar way, when we hear about a person who is very powerful and influential, one

envisions a person of large stature or physical strength as bold as the reputation.

Then a Margaret Thatcher, a Mother Teresa or a Sen. Robert Byrd appears. That is when one realizes physical size is not synonymous with leadership and influence.

Wheeling Jesuit University has adopted a working slogan. We cannot, nor are we able to do everything. Whatever we choose to

do, however, we should do with special excellence. Our university status is,

#### **Alumnus Saves Man From Fire**

om Scott '85 became a hero last March in about 30-35 seconds. That's the amount of time the Manhattan Beach, CA, police officer estimates it took him to run into a burning house, pull a disabled 79-year old man out of his bed and carry him to safety. Scott probably saved the life not only of the elderly resident, but also of Sgt. Derrick Abell, who accompanied Scott into the burning home and was overcome by smoke.

"The dispatcher told us the man was trapped in his bed," Scott said. "We followed the smoke and I could see flames coming from the bedroom. The room was filled with smoke and the bed was fully engulfed. The man had one leg and was holding onto a walker, which inhibited my ability to get him out.

"I pulled away the walker and he fell to the floor. My sergeant also went down about the same time. I grabbed them both and pulled them out. Everything moved in slow motion. Paramedics described it as tunnel syndrome—everything slows down and you only see one thing."

The elderly man suffered acute smoke inhalation along with minor burns on his leg and hands, but has now fully recovered, Scott said. The blaze, which was caused by a short in two electric blankets, was limited to the bedroom by the fire department. Scott's sergeant also suffered smoke inhalation, but recovered when he got outside.

Scott, who played basketball at Wheeling Jesuit, said he remembers his time in college as "the best four years of my life," adding that he learned how to be persistent and never give up. Those lessons proved valuable in

his nine years on the police force.

"I just feel fortunate that I was able to help someone get out and limit their injuries to minimal," he said.

Scott received an official commendation for his heroics and may be nominated for a Medal of Valor, the highest possible recognition for a police officer.

## Law School Acceptance Rate Still Perfect

heeling Jesuit University has maintained its perfect record of law school acceptances for its graduates, with six new applicants accepted this summer. Since 1992, WJU has had a 100 percent acceptance rate—28 entrants in 28 attempts.

Prelaw Academic Advisor Thomas Michaud called the acceptance rate "phenomenal for a university of our size" because law schools on the national average accept only slightly more than 25 percent of applicants.

This remarkable acceptance rate is a strong testimony to the discipline and hard work of our students and the superior preparation they received from our faculty," Michaud said.

The law schools the students chose are:

- Melissa Campbell of Wheeling chose Ohio University and received a partial tuition scholarship.
- **Kristi Brown** of Rockville, MD, selected Duquesne University with a partial scholarship.
- Nacy Alouise of Fombell, PA, enrolled at the University of Dayton.
- John Canter of Charleston, WV, also chose the University of Dayton.
- Ryan Ryder of Camp Hill, PA, received a full tuition scholarship to Dayton.

Michaud said WJU's record of success is likely to continue, as the university will maintain its intensive law school preparation program.

"I don't know how long our 100 percent streak will go on, but we are sure that we will continue to strive to offer the best possible preparation for our students," he said. "Students are trained on a simulated Law School Admissions Test every semester and they know exactly what it takes to perform well."
